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## Welcome to AUPO 2023



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Dear Colleagues,

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, welcome to the 57th annual meeting of the Association of University Professors of Ophthalmology. We are excited to once again be meeting in person, recognizing how much we learn from in-person interactions and networking. Our annual meeting remains the centerpiece of our activities, advancing our mission to serve, strengthen and support academic ophthalmology.

Our Program Committee, chaired by Dr. Don Budenz, and made up of leaders of all our constituencies, has developed an exciting and innovative program, providing important opportunities for each constituency to gather and share problems and best practices, and also gathering as a whole academic community to focus on key topics that affect us all. The all-day Educating the Educators remains a jewel of the meeting, the Research Directors have added a new roundtable session, and the administrators welcome Rolf Benirschke as the John Meade lecturer. We are all thrilled to have Dr. Eve Higginbotham lead off with a keynote lecture, followed by presentations on patient care delivery and community partnerships, telemedicine, teaching our trainees on disparities and health equity, and lastly Dr. Paul Lee on the promise of healthcare research. The presentations will be followed by a panel and all-member discussion which I am sure will be robust. Following the symposium, we will have a preliminary report by the AUPO's consultants on IDE, Drs. Lynn Gordon and Eve Higginbotham.

The AUPO is in a period of self-reflection and transition, as we seek to evaluate our expanding scope of programs, our governance, and our management support. The Board of Trustees has been working with a consulting group, Minding Your Business (MYB), to assess these needs and make recommendations. We look forward to sharing this work and proposals with membership as they are developed. The goal of the Board of Trustees is to be inclusive of all our members, and support the needs and desires of all constituencies, while working within the financial framework of our organization.

It has been an honor to serve as AUPO President in these times of challenge and creativity. I am humbled to work with the council leaders who bring great ideas and programs to the organization as we strive for ever more inclusive and responsive leadership of AUPO. 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## Straatsma Award for Excellence in Resident Education

The Straatsma Award was established through funding from the American Academy of Ophthalmology (AAO), the Association of University Professors of Ophthalmology (AUPO), and private funds, to recognize and celebrate an outstanding Program Director in ophthalmology.

Laura K. Green, MD has served as the Ophthalmology Residency Program Director at the Krieger Eye Institute at Sinai Hospital of Baltimore since 2010.

She is originally from Oakton, Virginia, outside of Washington, DC, and is a graduate of the College of William and Mary and the Vanderbilt University School of Medicine. Dr. Green completed her ophthalmology residency at Harvard/Massachusetts Eye and Ear Infirmary, followed by cornea fellowship at the Wilmer Eye Institute. She has been on the faculty of Sinai Hospital of Baltimore since 2007. Her research interests include simulation for medical and surgical training, medical education, and diversity, equity, and inclusion.

Dr. Green enjoys problem solving as an exercise in leadership, mentorship and creativity. She served as the chair of the Committee for Resident Education of the AAO, where she created innovative new educational modules including a site for diversity, equity, and inclusion, and continues to serve as an active leader in the AAO as Associate Secretary for State Affairs. She is a founding member of the GME: IDEA (Inclusion, Diversity, Education, and Awareness) committee at Sinai Hospital, which plans DEI education and pipeline outreach efforts for residents and faculty at Sinai Hospital, and is the current chair. She also has served on the AUPO Program Directors Council and is the chair of the Ophthalmology Review Committee for the ACGME. She enjoys mentoring program directors and young ophthalmologists.

## Excellence in Medical Student Education Award

The Award for Excellence in Medical Student Education provides national recognition for an outstanding medical student educator. It was established through funding from the Association of University Professors of Ophthalmology (AUPO) and the American Academy of Ophthalmology (AAO).

Prithvi S. Sankar, MD is a glaucoma specialist and a Professor of Clinical Ophthalmology, Director of Medical Student Education in the Department of Ophthalmology, an Advisory Dean and the Assistant Dean for Student Affairs and Residency Planning at the Perelman School of Medicine. Dr. Sankar is a

graduate of the University of Virginia, earning a Bachelor of Arts and subsequently his MD degree. He trained at the University of Pittsburgh for ophthalmology residency, and the Massachusetts Eye and Ear Infirmary for glaucoma fellowship. Following his training, he joined the faculty of the Scheie Eye Institute, University of Pennsylvania in 2001.

Dr. Sankar has numerous national roles including being the Past President of the Directors of Medical Student Education Council, an active member of the Minorities in Ophthalmology Mentoring Program, and a member of the AUPO SFMatch Oversight Committee. He continually advocates for the career advancements of the DMSEs and junior faculty. Because of his role as the DMSE, he teaches medical students in every year of their education, which he loves and is one of the highlights of his career. As an Advisory Dean, he helps students realize their excellence in any field; and as the Assistant Dean of Student Affairs and Residency Planning, he advises them to achieve their best in preparing for residency.

## RPB David F. Weeks Award for Outstanding Vision Research

The RPB David F. Weeks Award for Outstanding Vision Research (the "Weeks Award") has been established through the generosity of Research to Prevent Blindness (RPB), an anonymous donor, and the Association of University Professors of Ophthalmology (AUPO), to annually recognize and celebrate an outstanding ophthalmic vision scientist whose research has made meaningful contributions to the understanding and/or treatment of potentially blinding eye disease. The award carries the name of David F. Weeks, former President and Chairman of Research to Prevent Blindness, in honor of his contributions to the field of vision research.

David Calkins, PhD is one of the world's leading authorities on the neurobiological roots of blinding eye disease and identification of new therapeutic targets based on neuronal protection, repair, and regeneration. Dr. Calkins has chosen to take a broad and systems-oriented approach to understanding retinal and optic nerve degeneration. His research has introduced multiple paradigms into pathogenic mechanisms of progression in glaucomatous optic neuropathy – or glaucoma, the world's leading cause of irreversible blindness. He and his research team have painstakingly pursued new discoveries to uncover the most important neuronal, glial, and synaptic relationships that define progression of neurodegeneration in glaucoma. For his research contributions, he has been awarded an Alfred P. Sloan Foundation Neuroscience Fellowship, the Lewis Rudin Glaucoma Prize of The New York Academy of Medicine, and the Wasserman, Senior Scientific, and Stein Innovation Awards from Research to Prevent Blindness. In 2016, he was named a Gold Fellow of the Association for Research in Vision and Ophthalmology for his contributions to the vision research community. He recently was given the Presidential Glaucoma Award from Glaucoma Research Foundation for his seminal research contributions. He was also an inaugural awardee of the Stanley Cohen Innovation Fund at Vanderbilt.

Dr. Calkins completed undergraduate studies in mathematics at the University of Michigan Honors College, followed by doctoral work in neuroscience from the University of Pennsylvania. Following postdoctoral fellowships at the Max Plank Institute for Brain Research and the Johns Hopkins University Krieger Mind-Brain Institute, he became faculty at the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Center for Visual Science, where he continued his studies of retinal and optic nerve circuitry related to vision. He joined Vanderbilt University Medical Center in 2004 and was promoted to Professor in 2011. He has written over 100 research articles, reviews, and book chapters, including key publications in the *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, Nature, Science Translational Medicine, Progress in Retinal and Eye Research, Molecular Neurodegeneration,* and *Cell Death and Disease.* He also has held numerous editorial positions for neurology, ophthalmology, and neuroscience journals. Over the years, his innovative research has garnered over 70 grants and contracts from the National Institutes of Health, industry partners in biotechnology and pharmaceuticals, and private foundations.

Dr. Calkins is committed to service in the biomedical community. He has chaired numerous National Institutes of Health study sections and regularly reviews training grants, center grants, and program projects for several federal agencies. He has had leadership roles for many service committees in the ophthalmology and neuroscience research communities and regularly reviews fellowships and pilot grants for several not-for-profit organizations. He is a founding member and past president of the AUPO Research Directors Council. He recently served as Chair of the Glaucoma Research Foundation's Catalyst for a Cure Initiative to regenerate the optic nerve and is a scientific advisor for several biotech and pharmaceutical companies across the world.



## Resident and Fellow Research Forum Awards

AUPO and Research to Prevent Blindness established the Resident and Fellow Research Forum to acknowledge the importance of research in ophthalmic education. The Forum is intended to encourage the most promising house officers to pursue a career in academic ophthalmology and vision research. Following are the 2023 awardees:

BERTAN CAKIR, MD is a resident in the Harvard Ophthalmology Residency Training Program. He earned his medical degree in Germany and started his ophthalmology residency training at the University of Freiburg. In his residency, he was selected for the highly competitive research fellowship program by the German Research Foundation (Deutsche Forschungsgemeinschaft) under the mentorship of Dr. Lois Smith at Boston Children's Hospital, Harvard Medical School. During his time at Boston Children's Hospital, Dr. Cakir investigated novel treatment strategies targeting early stages of retinopathy of prematurity. Two of his first author publications were published in the Journal JCI Insight, one of which was selected as a highlighted article. His most recent research endeavors have focused on retinal energetics with the aim to develop a metabolic mapping device for the retina and optic nerve head. For this, he was awarded the competitive Boston Children's Hospital Technology Development Fund, a seed-stage academic catalyst fund dedicated to translating high-impact academic technologies. To date, Dr. Cakir has published over 30 peer-reviewed articles with over 900 citations. Dr. Cakir strives to be a clinician-scientist who investigates fundamental questions in ophthalmology with the goal to translate these findings into clinic and ultimately improve patient care.



**ELISE MA, MD, PHD** received her MD and PhD in Neuroscience as part of the Medical Scientist Training Program (MSTP) at the University of Maryland in Baltimore. Her doctoral dissertation elucidated bi-directional interactions of the brain-gut axis in the setting of traumatic brain injury, which was funded by the Ruth L. Kirschstein Institutional National Research Service Award (NRSA) in Gastroenterology. She then became involved in glaucoma research to optimize a novel technique for in vivo imaging of erythrocytes within retinal microvasculature, for which she was awarded the George Frick Award for Outstanding Research in Ophthalmology. To further enrich her experience with vision and eye research, she joined the EyeSTAR program at UCLA to complete a post-doctoral research fellowship. Under the mentorship of Dr. Joseph Caprioli, she has been investigating the role of aging on retinal ganglion cell degeneration and glial cell reactivity in response to optic nerve injury. Elise is currently a first-year ophthalmology resident at the Jules Stein Eye Institute at UCLA in her hometown of Los Angeles, where she continues to pursue her aspirations towards becoming a skilled clinician-scientist. Her research interests include glial cells in the retina and optic nerve and utilizing molecular transcriptomics to identify dynamic neuronal-glial interactions within the visual system.

**WARREN PAN, MD** is a second-year resident at the Kellogg Eye Center, University of Michigan. He completed an AB in Economics from Harvard University. He then pursued a combined MD/PhD from the University of Michigan, where he worked in the laboratory of Dr. Martin Myers studying the neuroscience of obesity and diabetes. Afterwards, he finished a post-doctoral MPhil at the University of Cambridge under the mentorship of Professor Sir Stephen O'Rahilly. His post-doctoral work built on his doctoral studies by translating his basic science research into improved clinical care for patients. As a resident at the Kellogg Eye Center, he has transitioned from neuronal metabolism into photoreceptor metabolism by working with Dr. Thomas Wubben and Dr. Cagri Besirli to understand the cellular metabolism of photoreceptors in retinitis pigmentosa. In the future, he hopes to be a clinician-scientist who continues to ask and answer clinically relevant questions to improve care for his patients.
