SUMMER STUDENT FELLOWSHIPS: Summer Student Fellowships are available to undergraduates, graduate and medical students interested in pursuing ophthalmology related clinical or basic research. For most students, this is their first exposure to eye or vision research and the experience has resulted in many students choosing academic ophthalmology and/or eye research as a full-time career. Awards of \$2,100 are given for 2-3 months of full-time research, usually during June–August.

POSTDOCTORAL AWARDS: Post-Doctoral Awards support individuals with a doctorate (PhD, DrPH, MD, OD or DVM) who are interested in academic careers in basic or clinical research in ophthalmology, vision or related sciences. This funding is intended to offer those interested in an academic career the opportunity to spend a year engaged in vision and eye research under the supervision of a senior scientist/clinician mentor. Residents and clinical fellows are required to spend sufficient time on the funded research project to carry out the proposed objectives while basic researchers are expected to work full-time. One year grants of \$20,000 are awarded for start dates between July 1 and September 1.

GRANTS-IN-AID: Grants-in-Aid (GIA) are intended to fund pilot projects and generate preliminary results for investigators who have limited or no other research funding. GIA are awarded to junior faculty members who have received their first faculty or research appointment within the previous three years and who are developing their independent scientific skills. A majority of recipients go on to successfully compete for larger, multi-year awards from the NIH or other governmental and private sources utilizing data generated by FFS funded projects. Support may only be used for equipment, consumable supplies or technical staff salary devoted to the specific research project. One year awards of \$20,000 are provided for start dates between July 1 and September 1.

AMERICAN SOCIETY OF CATARACT AND REFRACTIVE SURGERY (ASCRS)



ASCRS is an international, educational society with more than 9,000 members. Its mission is to advance the art and science of ophthalmic surgery and the knowledge and skills of ophthalmic surgeons by providing clinical and practice management education and by working with patients, government, and the medical community to promote the delivery and advancement of high-quality eye care.

Since its founding in 1974, ASCRS has led the field through significant advances in technology and clinical science through its educational programs, publications and on-line resources. ASCRS has become the surgeons' primary source of up-to-date clinical information, published research, and regulatory information affecting the practice of medicine.

Each year, ASCRS hosts the largest subspecialty meeting in ophthalmology, bringing together more than 4,000 anterior segment surgeons from around the world. The 4-day meeting features papers, symposia, instructional courses, films, posters, didactic wet labs, and advanced education for glaucoma, cornea, cataract and refractive surgery. ASCRS provides an excellent opportunity for residents and fellows to learn both fundamental skills and leading edge techniques.

ASCRS leadership has made a long-term commitment to the support and education of residents and fellows in ophthalmology. In addition to its many clinical offerings, the ASCRS Annual Meeting also includes a full half-day program developed specifically for the young ophthalmologist. The program focuses on important practice aspects and provides valuable insight for those beginning a career in ophthalmology.

Registration for the ASCRS/ASOA Symposium and Congress, along with Cornea Day and Glaucoma Day, is free for US residents and fellows.

History of AUPO

The Association of University Professors of Ophthalmology (AUPO) was founded in 1965 by several leaders in academic ophthalmology as an organization dedicated to research and education. The mission of AUPO is to serve, strengthen, and represent departments of ophthalmology; to provide support, information, and leadership opportunities to department chairs, program directors, and other faculty members; to promote excellence in ophthalmic education; to foster vision research and to promote ethical practice and excellence in eye care in order to ensure the best possible vision for the public. As such, AUPO is the voice of academic ophthalmology.

Initially including only chairs of ophthalmology divisions or departments in medical schools, the membership was later enlarged to include members who are chairs or co-chairs of departments or divisions of ophthalmology in any institutions that sponsor accredited ophthalmology residency training programs. A category of associate membership was established for residency program directors of accredited residency training programs in ophthalmology who do not chair their department or division. Canadian chairs and their residency program directors became eligible for membership in 1996. In 2006 and 2009 respectively, research directors and medical student educators in departments or divisions of ophthalmology in medical schools or other institutions sponsoring accredited ophthalmology residency training programs, became eligible for associate membership.

Special acknowledgement is due to the continuing support that has been provided by Research to Prevent Blindness (RPB) since the creation of AUPO in 1965. In addition to a very generous unrestricted donation and the support of the AUPO/RPB Resident and Fellow Research Forum, RPB joined with AUPO to match the donation of Bernard Becker, MD, initiating the Physician-Scientist Award, which was awarded in 2001 and 2006. Without the active participation by RPB since its founding, AUPO certainly would not have reached its current level of importance.

The Straatsma Award for Excellence in Resident Education was established in 2002 by AUPO and the American Academy of Ophthalmology. Program Directors have been recognized for this award each year since its inception.

The AUPO Fellowship Compliance Committee (FCC) was created in 2005 to provide training requirements for ophthalmology fellowships. It offers educational standards, protection of the public, institutions, and trainees, accountability and enforcement. To date, six ophthalmic subspecialties, supported by eight ophthalmic subspecialty societies, voluntarily participate in the compliance program. Its goals are accomplished by the following objectives: 1) Create standards for the participating subspecialties in establishing program requirements. 2) Define criteria for each participating subspecialty through the action of its own supporting organization(s), constituting standards for fellowship training including curriculum, research and clinical experience. 3) Determine initial compliance of individual fellowship programs through an application process. 4) Monitor compliance of individual fellowship programs with their subspecialty society's program requirements. 5) Monitor compliant programs on a regular review basis to assure that they remain in compliance. 6) Make compliance status publicly available so that fellowship applicants may use this information in their decision, likewise mentors will have compliance status available when advising residents on fellowship.

Straatsma Award

AUPO/AAO STRAATSMA AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN RESIDENT EDUCATION

Andreas K. Lauer, MD

Dr. Andreas Lauer completed medical school and internal medicine internship at University of Oklahoma College of Medicine. He then completed ophthalmology residency and retina fellowship at Casey Eye Institute (CEI) – Oregon Health & Sciences University (OHSU) after which he was appointed as faculty to their Retina Service. He served as Retina Fellowship Program Director between 2006 and 2010, Retina Division Chief since 2007, and Residency Program Director since 2001.

Throughout Dr. Lauer's academic career, residency education has been a continual focus of his efforts. Dr. Lauer instituted a structured review and assessment process that encourages efforts in teaching, learning, research and public service that resulted in an increase in residents publishing in peer-reviewed journals, taking teaching opportunities, participating in public service activities, and obtaining academic positions. In cooperation with the leadership of the Oregon Academy of Ophthalmology (OAO), he developed the OAO Resident Mentor program that promotes interaction between residents and non-university based ophthalmologists through quarterly mentorship meetings, clinical experiences and resident representation on the OAO board. Dr. Lauer garnered philanthropic support for educational activities, organized for awards to recognize residents who have excelled in the areas of research, teaching, and medical knowledge acquisition and created

awards to recognize faculty members in their teaching efforts. He has received the Robert C. Watzke department teaching award; the institutional Graduate Medical Education Service Award and three times received the Casey Eye Distinguished Service award.

Dr. Lauer was elected to the Association of University Professors in Ophthalmology (AUPO) Program Director's Council (PDC) and served as its President in 2012. Through this organization, he directed national symposia and served as liaison to the San Francisco Ophthalmology Matching Program, American Academy of Ophthalmology (AAO) and the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME) Ophthalmology Review Committee (RC), and the AUPO Fellowship Compliance Committee (FCC). In 2012, Dr. Lauer received the AAO Secretariat Award for national educational efforts. For the American Board of Ophthalmology (ABO), he has served as Oral Examiner, Item Writer for Maintenance of Certification, participant in pilot of the Practice Improvement Platform, and member of the Retina Content Outline Rating and Exam Development Committees.

Internationally, Dr. Lauer has been invited to serve as teaching faculty in Brazil, China, Hong Kong, and Japan. In 2014, he will co-chair the Education Colloquium at the quadrennial World Ophthalmology Congress in Tokyo, Japan.

Dr. Lauer's other interests include participation in clinical research. He has been OHSU's principal investigator for protocols sponsored by Diabetic Retinopathy Clinical Research network and has participated on their executive committee and manuscript-writing committees.

AUPO/RPB Resident and Fellow Research Forum Awards



Benjamin Fowler

Benjamin Fowler hails from Bethesda, Maryland. He earned his undergraduate degree with honors in biochemistry at Middlebury College, where he also served as captain of the track and field team. Ben joined the MD/PhD program at the University of Kentucky in 2009, and will return to medical school in the summer of 2014. Fowler's interest in ophthalmology stems from his research into the role of the non-coding transposon RNAs in atrophic AMD pathogenesis. These "junk" sequences comprise roughly half of our DNA, yet until studies by Ben and colleagues, their role in ocular pathophysiology was poorly understood. Ben would like to better understand the domestication of such "mobile elements", and define their function in eye health and disease. Per his contributions to the field, such investigations may lead to non-traditional therapeutic targets (i.e. not coding sequence) and diagnostic/prognostic assessment in AMD. Investigation of the ocular "mobilome" (i.e. the sum

of mobile elements in a genome) also promises to elucidate hidden forms of intra- and inter-individual genetic diversity, and help define the molecular evolution of vision and ocular plasticity. More philosophically, Ben expects that this line of research will lend keen insight into the delineation of self versus non-self.



Mohamed About Shousha, MD, PhD

I have always dreamed of becoming an ophthalmologist, a scientist and a teacher. Caring for my patients, then going to the laboratory to think how to serve them better and passing on the knowledge is the best career I would ever think of. I am an ophthalmology resident at the Saint Louis University Eye Institute. I completed an ophthalmology residency from Alexandria University, a clinical fellowship in cornea and external disease from the Bascom Palmer Eye Institute, a fellowship of the Royal College of Surgeons of Glasgow University (FRCS, Ophthalmology) of the

United Kingdom and a PhD of Ophthalmology and Visual Sciences from Ain Shams University. My research has made the cover of Ophthalmology in 2012 and the lead article in 2013. This leading journal has published 7 of my papers since 2010. My research has resulted in a patent, numerous publications in the top journals and awards including Best Paper of Session awards of the American Society of Cataract and Refractive Surgery for the last 5 years in a row. My current plan is to apply for a K-award to jump-start my clinician scientist career. My future plan is to make a difference in the field of ophthalmology.



Guadalupe Villarreal, Jr., MD

Guadalupe (Louie) Villarreal was born in McAllen, Texas. He graduated Phi Beta Kappa with a B.S. in Biology from Yale University. He received an M.D. from the Harvard-MIT Division of Health, Sciences, and Technology at Harvard Medical School, where he also completed a

Howard Hughes Medical Institute Research Training Fellowship. He completed internship at the Signature Healthcare Brockton Hospital in Brockton, Massachusetts. He is currently a resident at the Wilmer Eye Institute at Johns Hopkins Hospital. He is committed to pursuing a career in academic ophthalmology and hopes to serve patients both through direct clinical care and scientific investigation.



Glenn C. Yiu, MD, PhD

Glenn C. Yiu, MD, PhD was born in Hong Kong and grew up in Brooklyn, NY. He completed his undergraduate studies at Columbia University, graduating summa cum laude with a double major in Biochemistry and Psychology. In 2000, he moved to Boston to pursue a combined MD-PhD degree at Harvard Medical School, obtaining his PhD in Neurobiology in 2006, and an MD with honors in 2008. His graduate thesis explored mechanisms of axon regeneration in the central nervous system. After completing a medical internship at Brigham &

Women's Hospital, he underwent residency training in ophthalmology at the Massachusetts Eye & Ear Infirmary. Currently, he is a clinical fellow in vitreoretinal surgery at Duke University, where he is involved in research examining the choroid's role in ocular disease using enhanced-depth optical coherence tomography. Dr. Yiu has been the recipient of numerous awards, including the Heed Ophthalmic Foundation Fellowship Award, the Retina Society Fellowship Research Award, and the Ronald G. Michels Foundation Fellowship Award. After training, he wishes to pursue an academic career as a clinician-scientist.
